Youngster nets impressive catch and prizemoney

ELLA Davis showed onlookers how it was done at Waverley's first youth fishing festival when she caught the day's first tagged rainbow trout.

Ella, who left the event \$100 richer, said her prizemoney would be spent on Christmas presents.

Community Housing Limited community development officer Brett Mansell said yesterday was an opportunity to strengthen community

connections and showcase the Waverley Lake.

He said the event came about after a chat with Waverley Primary School principal Tony Brazendale.

"I was talking to Tony and we were looking at the lake and we thought what a resource to tap into," Mr Mansell said.

"We said 'let's have a crack at it' and try and develop something that can turn into a premier event for Waverley."

The Waverley Youth Fishing Festival was supported by Community Housing Limited, Inland Fisheries Tasmania and Waverley Primary School.

Healthy food website reinstated

SYDNEY - A healthy food rating website has been reinstated by the federal government 10 months after it was pulled down.

The Health Star Rating website was initially launched by Assistant Health Minister Fiona Nash in February but was pulled down shortly afterwards.

It was relaunched yesterday to provide a system of rating food based on energy, saturated fat, total sugars and sodium content.

The website take-down sparked claims that Senator

Nash's former chief of staff was a junk food lobbyist.

Alastair Furnival, chief of staff at the time, resigned following the controversy.

Labor health spokeswoman Catherine King said it was "about time" that the website was relaunched.

"The site had been in development for two years and had the backing of every state and territory health minister," Ms King said yesterday.

But Senator Nash said an educational campaign to pro-

mote the rating system wasn't ready at the time of the original launch.

"I was concerned that people would walk into supermarkets ... and there would be a level of confusion that would lead to not enabling this system to be successful," she said.

Products will have a higher star rating if they are low in saturated fat, sugars, sodium and energy.

The Heart Foundation has given the labelling scheme its tick of approval.

Jail for hotel murder

PARIS - British businessman Ian Griffin has been jailed for 20 years by a Paris court for the brutal murder of his Polish-born girlfriend in a five-star hotel in the French capital. The jury found 45-year-old Griffin guilty despite his claim that he had no recall of the incident because he had blacked out in their room at the exclusive Le Bristol hotel near the Champs Elysees in May 2009. His wealthy girlfriend, Kinga Wolf, 36, died of massive internal bleeding. Her skull, jaw and larynx were smashed and more than 100 marks were found on her body, from her face to her feet.

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
